Subject Information

A Level Politics develops your knowledge and understanding of the society that you live in. It allows you to develop an understanding of how power works, how ideas become laws and how we are represented in the United Kingdom.

Politics matters. Every headline, every news bulletin, every aspect of our lives is influenced by politics.

A level Politics involves the study of prime ministers and presidents. We look at politics from the highest levels of government right down to how ordinary people get involved through voting or through protest movements. Politics is a subject for those people who like tackling important debates and arguments. You can challenge other people's ideas, whilst also developing your own, as we consider what it means to be a liberal, a conservative or a socialist.

Career Pathways

Politics is one of the most popular subjects to study at A Level. A Level Politics is valued by universities and employers, since it requires the development of analytical skills and demonstrates the ability to evaluate political, social, and economic issues. An A Level in Politics can lead to a range of different careers including law, politics, journalism, teaching, charities, business, consultancy, accountancy, and the media.
